Events: Our annual Fall Garden Party in Manhattan Beach on Sunday Sept. 24th was a huge success. Member Profiles

It's made even better when they share your interest in what has been happening around the world ever since antiquity. But we also tend to be busy and not able to make most gatherings. So how do we get to know the wide range of people in this great group of ours? Chapter president Ken Seligson and I agreed to put me to work writing a series of member profiles, perhaps one each month.

Much has changed since I joined AIA-LA in 2003. Birgitta Lindros Wohl (CSU Northridge) was the president in those days and kept things stirred up. I was a historian writing books about the ancient Mediterranean and worked with so many archaeologists that being in this group felt very natural




The Cotsen Institute of Archaeology Press cordially invites you to Author Spotlight featuring the recent publication of two volumes edited by Sarah Morris and John Papadopoulos, the results of a ten-year collaboration with colleagues in Greece, which bring to light discoveries at Ancient Methone from 2003 to 2013. Methone was inhabited from the Late Neolithic period until its destruction by Philip II of Macedon in 354 BC, a long history that included colonization by Eretria in the late eighth century BC and close affiliation with Athens, which valued its access to timber for ships. The two volumes cover historical sources, inscribed materials, prehistoric domestic and burial remains, Iron Age settlement, and Archaic through Classical workshops and products in clay, glass, metal, bone, and ivory through the siege by Philip II. The project was supported by the Steinmetz Chair in Classical Archaeology and Material Culture, as well as travel funds for Cotsen Institute students from the Steinmetz Family Foundation. We invite you to celebrate this publication and a project that included many students, staff, faculty, and research affiliates of the Cotsen Institute.

Coffins are important social documents, but they are difficult to document, photograph, and analyze. For the past ten years, Dr. Cooney has been systematically examining human reactions to social crises, specifically focusing on material adaptations evident within an ideological context and documenting coffins from Dynasty 18 to 22. This research is the first systematic study of funerary arts reuse and theft within the field of Egyptology and the first thorough photographic documentation of these coffins. In this lecture Dr. Cooney will offer a case study of the royal coffin of Thutmose III, discovered in 1881 in the DeB 320 Royal Cache, and discuss the evidence of reuse she has documented on this coffin.
